There's a human tendency to want or even need to lift up certain other people and to make them our heroes. Some hold in very high esteem sports figures, entertainers, politicians or others. And to some degree this is good, for we need role models and positive examples to follow.

But of late, there has been much news about high profile people who some have thought of as heroes failing and falling. The news has been filled with allegations, charges, confessions and embarrassed people. People who have been victimized are publically sharing their pain. And there is some level of surprise and shock with each story.

Certainly it is all sad. And some observers are crestfallen that their "heroes" have fallen. But there are important spiritual lessons to be learned here, including:

- Let us always remember that we're all sinful, flawed and broken people in one way or another. Every person in the Bible had his or her human weaknesses and failures. Each of us do.
- Therefore, we need to be very careful not to place any person on a pedestal or above reproach.
- Humbly, we must confess our brokenness and limitations, and be reminded that we need a Savior whose life, love and message can redeem us daily.
- The only true hero we should have is Jesus Christ, who will never fail us.

So I invite you to make Jesus your only hero in this new year.

God in Many Faces

January 11th is National Human Trafficking Awareness Day. Although slavery was abolished in the United States by the Thirteenth Amendment in 1865, it still exists in various forms today. The U.S. is a source, transit and destination country for modern slaves, including men, women and children. Victims can be of foreign nationality or U.S. citizens who are subject to sex trafficking, forced labor, involuntary servitude, forced marriage and debt bondage. They can be any age, socioeconomic status, race or gender.

Human trafficking illegally exploits a person through force, fraud or coercion, and it's a very profitable crime. Human smuggling is a different crime – it's the illegal movement of someone across a border. Trafficking can happen in the suburbs, in rural towns and in cities.

Sex trafficking victims are manipulated or forced against their will to engage in sex acts for money. Traffickers might use violence, threats, manipulation, or the promise of love or affection to lure victims. Truck stops, hotel rooms, rest areas, street corners, clubs and private residences are some of the places where victims are forced to sell sex.

Forced labor victims could be found, for example, in factories, on farms or doing construction work. Often victims are forced to manufacture or grow products that we use and consume every day. Through force, fraud or coercion, victims are made to work for little or no pay.

With domestic servitude, traffickers sometimes take a victim's identification papers and travel documents in order to limit their freedom. Victims are hidden in plain sight, forced to work in homes across the U.S. They're prisoners working as nannies, maids or domestic help.

Every year in the U.S., thousands of human trafficking cases are reported, but many go undetected. Trafficking is a hidden crime with victims often afraid to come forward. We may not recognize the signs, even if it's happening right in front of us.

Thanks to all who harvested, worked in, watered, contributed to and prayed for our Trinity garden. Over 3,200 servings of 21 vegetables were delivered to the Lord's Pantry.

If you haven't been to the Pantry, you should stop by and meet the awesome people who work there. They serve from 1,100 – 1,300 patrons every month. They receive fresh produce from farms in the area and from our garden to supplement the staples they provide.

Two Eagle Scout projects are being planned for next spring: a storage shed and a greenhouse which will extend our growing season. We'll need some extra help with the greenhouse, and any help or advice will be greatly appreciated.

The garden was self-sustaining this year. All our needs were met by donations of seeds, plants and materials from several members of the group and the church.

We'll meet again in early spring to plan for the year, so please keep this ministry in your prayers. Your thoughts and suggestions are needed.

We meet at Trinity's kitchen at 3 p.m., prepare the meal, depart for Safe Harbor at 5, serve dinner and eat with the residents, and then depart for home by 7 p.m. The cost is a share of the dinner expenses, depending on how many adults participate in the trip. The View from Here

One year folds into the next. We mark it by a change of calendars. Psychologically, we cobble together a sense of transition by making resolutions, talking about clean slates, and assessing the past year with an eye to change. But really, December 31st and January 1st are separated only by a night of celebration or quietude.

Still, it can be useful to look back and consider what we've come through and look ahead in anticipation of the possibilities. We can do that with energy and purpose or with trepidation within the framework of a cautionary tale. I usually end the year participating in one or two "year-end close out" programs offered by people in my creative tribe. We look at the year through the lens of some exploratory questions that will give us a head start on setting a tone for the new year that's hopeful.

And therein lies a problem. A year of unhappiness or struggles, perceived or actual, can bleed into the next 12 months carrying with it the fear there's only going to be more of the same.

For me, 2017 was a rocky journey over a pot-holed road. The end of my marriage, an experimental sojourn living in the wilds of New York, my beloved dog getting cancer, moving from my home of 20 years. And I know a lot of other folks experienced similar or worse.

I can tell you that faith can boil down to feeling like you're wrestling with the angel. Walking the talk can seem fraudulent, or worse, fraught with hypocrisy.

A verse kept coming to mind — the one in Psalms that says God's word is a lamp unto my feet. Long ago, I had decided what worked about that passage was that faith was like having a flashlight that could give you illumination only so far. God isn't in the business of showing us the road for miles and miles ahead, but clearly enough to take the next right step. Because that's what we need and because it doesn't do us any good to try living the rest of our lives in the next five minutes.

So I'm trying to take one step at a time. Sometimes well, often flawed. Relieved by the knowledge that there's no such thing as a clean slate. Just today, held together by grace, with some space within it for hope and possibility to take root.

Winter Weather

- We never cancel worship services.
- We encourage you to decide for yourself if you can safely make it to church.

- If you arrive on site and there's some snow or ice on sidewalks, and **if** you're able, feel free to shovel, sweep or place ice melt on these areas. There's ice melt and a shovel or broom at each entrance.
- Please walk and drive very carefully when on church property. Also, be alert and careful when walking inside the building. Floors could easily be wet and slippery due to tracked-in snow.



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
