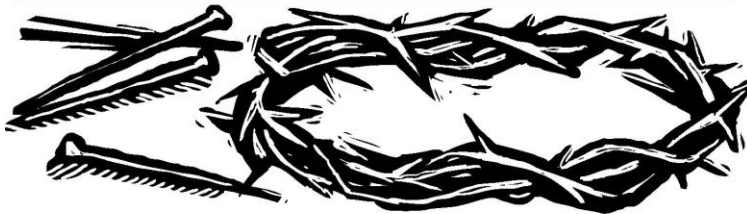
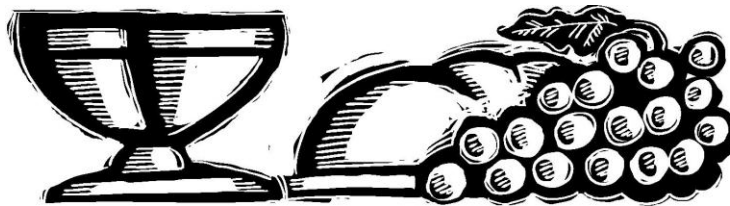

From the Pastor

Without a Vision the People Perish

One of my responsibilities as the pastor of Trinity is to help guide our movement into the future. As a leader, my task is to think ahead and to call others to do the same.

Over my long tenure, there have been several junctures when we've done this as we've called together members and leaders to prayerfully discern where God is calling us in the immediate future.

NOW is such a time.

So I'm enthused to let you know that on March 18th we'll be holding the first of several events to again bring together our thoughts, our hopes, our faith and our discernment and to start looking into the next season of our congregational life.

It's called VISION QUEST. On Sunday, March 18th, we'll gather in Starr Hall, 12:30 – 3:30 p.m. for a guided session of reflection and sharing, asking ourselves, "Who is God calling us to be as a congregation as we move ahead?"

I expect over 100 people to participate in this serious time of prayerful reflection. It will center on guided table talk as small groups gather to consider a few big questions guided by a table facilitator. I hope you'll prayerfully consider registering for this event and committing several hours to helping your church think about the future of our congregational ministry. I hope that newer members and younger members will especially know that your input is needed.

This is just the beginning of a year-long process, and it's important that we get off to a strong start. So consider participating, and please hold this process in your prayers.

Creation Care

March 19th – 25th is the Environmental Protection Agency's 10th annual Fix a Leak Week. Household leaks can waste more than one trillion gallons of water annually nationwide. Mark your calendars and look for and fix leaks inside and outside your home to save valuable water and money all year long.

A leaky faucet dripping at the rate of one drop per second can waste more than 3,000 gallons per year. A shower leaking 10 drips per minute wastes more than 500 gallons per year. Repair leaks by checking faucet washers and gaskets. Replace old toilets with WaterSense[®] models and save 13,000 gallons of water per average family per year.

Check your water meter before and after a two-hour period when no water is being used. If the meter changes at all, you probably have a leak. Identify toilet leaks by placing a drop of food coloring in the toilet tank. If any color shows up in the bowl after 10 minutes, you have a leak. (Be sure to flush immediately after the experiment to avoid staining the tank.)



10th Annual Hackettstown St. Patrick's Day Parade

God in Many Faces

March 8th is International Women's Day, and this year's theme is *Press for Progress*. The *2017 Global Gender Gap Report* surveyed 144 countries regarding their progress on gender parity via four main themes: Economic Participation and Opportunity, Educational Attainment, Health and Survival, and Political Empowerment. Also included was data on gender gaps across industry talent pools and occupations. Data shows that the gender gap is widening. Instead of taking 170 years to close the gap at the current rate of progress, it's estimated that gender parity across the world will take over two centuries, 217 years to be exact.

Started by the Suffragettes, the first International Women's Day was celebrated in 1911. The day belongs to all communities everywhere - governments, companies, charities, educational institutions, networks, associations, the media and more. Whether through a global conference, community gathering, classroom lesson or dinner table conversation, everyone can play a purposeful part in pressing for gender parity. Do what you can to truly make a positive difference for women.

March 21st is the United Nation's International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination. The theme for this year: Promoting tolerance, inclusion, unity and respect for diversity in the context of combating racial discrimination.

Article 1 of the *Universal Declaration of Human Rights* states that all human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights. And based on Article 2, everyone is entitled to all the rights and freedoms set forth in the declaration, without distinction of race or any other kind. Yet racism, xenophobia and intolerance are prevalent in all societies and discriminatory practices are widespread, particularly targeting migrants and refugees, as well as people of African descent. All nations and communities are urged to take comprehensive measures to combat racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance, and to promote tolerance, inclusion, unity and respect for diversity. Every day, all of us can stand up against racial prejudice and intolerant attitudes.

Please save the date! Our biggest food drive of the year is coming up and we need your help. On Saturday, May 12th, post offices across the country will be participating in the annual "Stamp Out Hunger" food drive. On that day, people are asked to place non-perishable foods by their mailboxes. Postal workers will pick up the bags of food while making their mail deliveries and the food is then donated to local food banks and pantries.

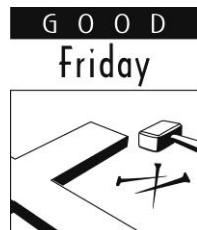
The Hackettstown and Budd Lake post offices graciously donate their collected food to us, and we need many hands that day to collect, sort and store the food. There are many ways that you can help:

- Leave non-perishable food items (no glass, please) out that day at your mailbox, or deliver food to your post office or directly to the Lord's Pantry.
- Tell friends and family about the event. Maybe your business or organization can sponsor a private food drive and deliver the food on May 12th.
- Consider volunteering your time that afternoon, either as a driver to pick up food from the post offices or as a food sorter. Watch for future *Just Say Yes* forms in the worship bulletin for your opportunity to sign up.

With your help, we can have a successful food drive and continue to fight food insecurity in our area!

During the month of January we served 1,239 people (423 families): 352 children, 731 adults and 156 seniors.

Excerpt from Bishop John Schol's letter about school violence.

We use prayer to lift our concerns, we share our deepest agonies and we cry out to God. Through prayer God answers and God's message to us is clear. Our prayers to God call us to action.

It is never harder to have these conversations with God than in the midst of tragedies of senseless violence. We've committed ourselves to pray for other similar tragedies.

I call you to discern together how your prayer can turn into action. What will you do to break the cycle of violence in our communities? How can you help your community address the social conditions that lead to this violence: mental illness, racism, poverty, addiction, social isolation and bullying? Our founder, John Wesley, called us to personal holiness and social holiness. Personal holiness will deepen your prayer life at this time but what does social holiness look like in the face of senseless violence in our schools? How do you bring body and spirit, faith and works together? Let's all commit to see every person as made in the image of God, challenge people with extremist views, support programs that work with mental illness in our communities, address bullying, reach out to the isolated, never let a comment that degrades another person or gender or race go unchecked, and model hearts of peace in our living.

There is evil in the world but it does not mean that we allow evil to go unchecked. Living a life of faith that is practiced by doing the right thing in the face of evil and violence is connecting body and spirit and in these times, the interconnection is even more critical.

The View from Here

Holy Week. But in just about any week, there's so much awful stuff going on in our world that looking for the holy is a real effort. But here we are, traveling through Lent on our way to Easter, our holiest and most significant time of our Christian year.

There is a way to navigate through these days that makes sense, which holds us in a supportive connectedness. Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, the Vigil, Resurrection Sunday. We hope for the best, darkness seems to overwhelm, we hold the pain, we endure and even thrive.

I began thinking about this when we heard of another school shooting, an event that has been happening at a rate of terrible regularity. And knowing that any sort of cease fire in Syria was an illusion. We can add to this litany of deeply troubling political and societal concerns until we can feel very helpless and sometimes hopeless.

Placing our daily lives within the context of our faith can be an adventure, a plunge, an experiment, a test, a refuge. The act of doing so can become the holy place. It just seemed to me, once I got going on the idea, that we act out the "stations" of Holy Week throughout our lives. We go along without any great catastrophes or even heavy-duty frustrations (the Palm Sunday lifestyle), we run headlong into the sort of situation where we begin praying, "Please God, let one and one not be two." Or life around us and the tragedies we see happen cause us to jump the rails for a time emotionally or spiritually. (Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.) We dwell for however long we need to in the valley, in the cocoon of our pain, in the womb of healing (the Vigil). And then, if we hang onto God, onto the risen Christ, not just our professed faith, we can believe, however tenuously or strongly or doubtfully, that we're held within a resurrected life. We're not alone.

Recently, the idea of sanctuary came up in a group discussion. I love the concept of sanctuary and I'm ready to throw it into the mix. Holy Week embodies within its celebrations and horrors and disorientations and triumphs the possibility of sanctuary. Sanctuary in terms of a sheltered and protected place of nourishment and healing, as well as a space within which to grow stronger and deeper. And sanctuary in terms of a holy place where we abide in the presence of God, knowing that's true whether we feel it or not.

And in this way, our Lent journey can help us grieve and celebrate, endure and thrive.
