When We Disagree

The United Methodist Church, of which we're a part, is going through a very difficult time. There is much disagreement regarding the matters of human sexuality which were recently decided upon at the General Conference. That disagreement has also emerged among some here at Trinity, and I'm not surprised at that. Good Christian people of sincere and heartfelt faith will often see things very differently.

John Wesley, the founder of Methodism, envisioned a church where such disagreements could be discussed in love. He did not create a church where everyone was expected to think alike. In fact, he once said:

Though we may not think alike, may we not love alike? May we not be of one heart though we are not of one opinion? Without all doubt, we may. Herein all the children of god may unite, notwithstanding these smaller differences.

Since then, Methodists have often had disagreements about important matters. Examples include the ordination of women, the civil rights movement, the Vietnam War, and most recently our national political landscape.

Jesus's final prayer on earth was that the Body of Christ might be one. He desired unity. Not unity of thought, but unity of love for one another.

Wherever you may have disagreements — family, work, friends, church — please remember this prayer of Jesus and keep unity of love as your ultimate goal.

When we attend worship, we let people know we're Christian. When we join a church, we let the world know we're committed to a specific local church. And when we include our church in our last will and testament, we let people know in our final communication that we deeply believe in the work of God in our church.

One way that we help that "message" get communicated is to place the names of all persons doing so on our permanent "Fellowship for Our Future" plaque in the foyer of our main church building. Perhaps now is a good time for you to update or create your will, and to include Trinity Church in your final wishes.

God in Many Faces

April is Genocide Awareness Month, a time for education about the history of previous and contemporary genocides and to advocate against future mass atrocities. During World War II, a Polish lawyer of Jewish decent, Raphael Lemkin, coined the term "genocide" to describe the coordinated plan aimed at the destruction of certain groups' essential foundations of life, including its social institutions, culture, language, national or ethnic identities, religion and economic existence. Such a plan also includes destroying the personal security, liberty, health and dignity, as well as the lives, of individuals belonging to the group. Examples of genocide include:

- Beginning in 1915: near eradication of the Armenian population.
- Beginning in 1933: Holocaust, resulting in the death of six million Jews and others.
- 1932 – 1933: Holodomor, an artificial famine imposed by Stalin's regime on Soviet Ukraine that killed up to eight million people.
- 1941: Babi Yar massacre in Kiev, Ukraine, killing nearly 34,000 Jews in two days.
- 1975: Pol Pot and the Khmer Rouge's killing of people belonging to specific groups, as well as the involuntary relocation of all city dwellers to the countryside for forced labor resulting in famine and the death of two million people.
- 1992 – 1995: siege of Sarajevo, Srebrenica and other cities in Bosnia and Herzegovina, leading to the deaths of more than 200,000 Bosnian Muslims.
- 1984 – 1988: the Al-Anfal Campaign under Saddam Hussein which destroyed and depopulated the Kurdistan region in northern Iraq and used chemical weapons causing the deaths of over 180,000 Kurds and others.
- 1994: 800,000 Tutsis and moderate Hutus were slain by the Interhamwe in Rwanda over a period of three months.
- 2003: the displacement and killing of Darfurians began by the government of Sudan, which led to hundreds of thousands of deaths and the displacement of 44 million people.
- Beginning in 2014: the Islamic State has forcefully caused the civilian population of the Ezidi-Kurdish religious minority in Iraq and Syria to flee from their ancestral homes as a result of forced conversion, killing, kidnaping and enslaving.

This month, as we celebrate the holiest of our Christian holidays and consider our environmental stewardship on Earth Day, we may feel a strong aversion to the inclusion of genocide education. And yet awareness that the events listed here have occurred in what we would consider recent time, not in some long ago past, is important. And at the root of all such atrocities is the "us and them" mentality of divisiveness, prejudice, and fear and hatred of those perceived as different from ourselves.

- ✓ Hope for good weather!


During February, we served 1,007 people: 305 children, 594 adults and 108 seniors.

The View from Here

My friend scheduled an art seminar series for the spring. The meeting days were three Sunday afternoons, including Easter Sunday. I told her I couldn't participate on that day. This was, after all, the major celebratory event of our Christian year. She rescheduled that date to a different Sunday.

We live in a society where the bunny and the baskets eclipse the cross in popular culture. There's nothing wrong with egg hunts and chocolate rabbits. But it just might come as a surprise to a lot of people that a bunch of us could be as elated as we are to celebrate Easter morning.

It could come as a surprise that the story of an angel appearing to a young woman announcing her miraculous pregnancy inspires us to birth Christ into our own lives. The angel of annunciation comes to us, too.

Lent generally means giving up something for 40 days, preferably something you wouldn't mind giving up. But the idea that Lent could call us to cast aside the spirit of divisiveness or fear or actions that aren't life affirming for 40 days and then for 40 more and 40 more....that isn't in mainstream culture's playbook.

Communion is a feast of life and love, very different from the banquet of hatred and cynicism that many sit down to not realizing it's themselves they're devouring.

Recently, for another publication, I wrote about the idea of "locus standi," a place to stand from which to view life, a heart-centered home in an ever-changing world. I said that this place can also be an "axis mundi," a center point around which the wheel of life revolves. A locus standi can be an actual home or it can be an orientation where the believed and imagined and deeply felt become incarnational in a manner that feeds our lives, our minds, our spirits. It seems to me that faith can infuse our locus standi and radiate out from the axis mundi.

In this way, the annunciation, the birth, the way, truth and life, the crucifixion, the resurrection and the spirit's indwelling enter our heart homes to dwell with us. They endow us with a way of seeing, if we allow it, that makes our world look different. Better. More hopeful. A viewpoint where Easter becomes a reality of daily life.
